Between August 1982 and the withdrawal in February 1984 America lost a total of 270 servicemen including Marines, Sailors, Soldiers and Airmen.

I had spoken out about America going in to Lebanon, I had said it would bite them in the ass, I was wrong... It was a nibble, it was just the beginning.

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Over the years I have seen America get involved in places it didn't belong trying to help with things it didn't always comprehend.
